

Strategic objectives for the Commission

In its strategic objectives for 2005-2009, the Commission declared

"the particular need for an all-embracing maritime policy aimed a developing a thriving maritime economy, in an environmentally sustainable manner. Such a policy should be supported by excellence in marine scientific research, technology and innovation"





The Blue Book



- An Integrated Maritime Policy for the European Union
- Maritime future for Europe that builds on the strong maritime heritage and looks strategically forward
- For the first time the EU has explicitly recognised that an integrated approach is needed for the seas and oceans
- There is a maritime dimension to virtually every major issue facing Europe today









The Blue Book



- Need for a cohesive and allembaressing way of policy-making
- A genuine, single vision of the oceans and seas
- Policy that will feed from, and into, other Community policies
- On the 10 October a package of 3 key documents has been adopted:
 - 1. The Blue Book
 - 2. Action Plan
 - 3. Communication which sets out the conclusions of the consultation process





The Action Plan



- Outlines the first steps that will be taken forward implementing the policy
 - Deploying Europe's strength to combat climate change
 - European strategy for maritime research
 - Better regulation of maritime transport
 - Respect for the crucial role of ports in driving economic growth while aiming for sustainability
 - Taking into account the environmental impact of all forms of development
 - Better use of planning tools, data networks and horizontal coordination
 - Backing maritime clusters and centres of excellence





The Action Plan



- Need for concrete proposals to address the challenges ahead
- Discover our own modern-day `new world' opportunities
- "Nothing ventured, nothing gained!"





The Action Plan



- Coveres different issues and activities:
 1. Maritime Governance
 - 2. Tools for integrated policy
 - 3. Maximising the sustainable use of the oceans and seas
 - 4. Building a knowledge and information base for the maritime policy
 - 5. Delivering the highest quality of life in coastal regions
 - 6. Promoting Europe's leadership in international maritime affairs
 - 7. Raising the visibility of maritime Europe





Tools for integrated policy



- Surveillance Activities
- Maritime Spatial Planning and integrated coastal zone management
- European Marine Observation and Data Network





Maritime Spatial Planning



- Important tool to help an integrated approach
- EU is aiming to help facilitate related activities, support the exchange of best practices, dissiminate good examples
- Respect the subsidiary principle and the need for regional approaches

The way forward



- In 2008 a series of preparatory actions as a first stage
- A number of other supporting actions, e.g. Communication on ports policy, on illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing, on sustainable tourism ...
- December European Council endorsing this integrated policy
- Blue Book is not the end of the voyage, nor the beginning but a significant milestone





Regions for economic change

- Two maritime related priorities:
 - 1. Managing coastal zones
 - 2. Reaping the benefits of the sea
- Programme funded under INTERREG IVC
- About "partnership in action"
- Exchange of good practices
- Interest in stimulating the organisation and coordination of regional maritime actions based on a cross-sectoral, intergrated approach
